#### **COUNTY COMMISSIONERS**

It is a pleasure to present to our community the 17th annual Report to the People. Before proceeding, I would like to take the opportunity to share the accomplishments of our Public Health Department, with support from many other county agencies, during the global COVID-19 pandemic.

In May given the lack of COVID testing available in our community, the County's Health Department started a drive-thru clinic so our citizens would have convenient access to testing. The COVID testing site at the Stanly Commons remained in place for close to eight (8) months and conducted a total of 4,394 COVID tests. Since early January 2021, the County's Health Dept. has transitioned to COVID vaccine distribution. Between early January and early March, over 6,000 residents received their 1st dose of the COVID vaccine and over 2,500 received their 2nd dose at the County's drive-thru vaccine clinic.

The County remains committed to vaccinating our citizens as quickly as possible contingent on vaccine resources being available and consistent with the State's identified priority group distribution plan.

The following report highlights additional activities, accomplishments, facility enhancements, project updates and outcomes achieved by various County services in the past year. Below please find a list of some, but not all, of our key accomplishments in 2020:

- Secured over \$5 million in water and sewer grant funding to assist with attracting Charlotte Pipe to Oakboro
- Maintained the tax rate for the 14th consecutive year
- Increased operational funding to the local school system to enhance instructional resources
- Allocated additional public safety capital resources for vehicle and ambulance replacement and officer body cameras
- Started the architectural design for a new 30,000 square foot trades based educational facility on the campus of Stanly Community College to enhance training for electrical wiring, HVAC technicians, plumbing, carpentry, machining, welding, auto repair and auto mechanics
- Awarded the construction contract for rehabilitation of the West Stanly Waste Water Treatment Plant in order to meet the growth demands in western Stanly
- Completed the construction of a new EMS base and radio communications tower to improve emergency response and interagency communication

The Board of Commissioners continues to place an emphasis and priority on education, public safety and economic development related programs and services. Further, we will strive to ensure programs and services are delivered in an efficient manner with outstanding customer service.

#### TRANSPORTATION

### Airport

The Stanly County Airport continues to experience steady utilization from both general aviation and military activities.

#### **Key Projects & Other Activities**

 Planning, coordination and the pursuit of funding continues with the Air National Guard to enhance the runway and taxiway for continued C17 training operations



- A broadband tower was installed to provide high-speed Internet coverage across the entire airport property
- A State grant was secured to remove rubber, repaint all striping and seal cracks on the runways and taxiway
- The beacon tower, glide slope and localizer storage buildings were all repainted with a State DOT grant
- The airfield lighting rehabilitation project was also completed. All lighting has been converted to LED to save long term energy and bulb replacement costs

## Stanly County Agri-Civic Center

The Stanly County Agri-Civic Center is a multi-use complex housing offices of the NC Cooperative Extension Service, USDA Rural Development, Natural Resources Conservation Services, North Carolina Forestry Service and the Farm Service



Agency as well as a 1,050-seat performing arts theatre, banquet facilities and several multi-purpose meeting rooms.

#### Highlights of building maintenance and improvement projects:

- Repaired, sanded and refinished the auditorium stage
- Replaced a roof top HVAC unit with a new gas pack unit
- Installed new lighting outside the Farm Services Agency to enhance safety and security for those parking in that area
- Installed a boulder retaining wall to address erosion issues on the backside of the facility and replaced the mulch




# Stanly County Library & History Center

The Stanly County Public Library and History Center provides books, information, and programming for citizens of all ages.

- Issued 1,635 new library cards
- Over 4,500 new titles were added to the eBook collection
- Added approximately 11,000 new resources to the Library System's overall collection
- Checked out over 108,500 items (decrease of 28%)
- The History Center which includes the museum and Margaret Johnson Heritage Room saw a sharp decline in average visitors per month in 2020 due to COVID. The number of visitors per month decreased from 280 (14 per day) to 44 (2 per day).

#### **Library Materials Checked Out - 2020**




### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

### 911 Communications

Provides 24 hour, 365 day 911 call dispatch services to the citizens of Stanly County with prompt and courteous assistance to those callers on both the 911 emergency and non-emergency phone lines. Major projects for 2020 include:

- The County's 5th emergency radio communications tower adjacent to the Eastside Volunteer Fire Department on NC 24/27/73 came on line in mid-2020. This has enhanced radio coverage for first responders in areas east of Stony Gap Road.
- Fire dispatch protocols were reviewed and overhauled to update existing codes, response plans and dispatch methods.
- Radio location services technology via GPS was fully implemented allowing the location of portable radios in the field to be viewed by 911
- In 2020, 911 processed 126,469 calls for service, this represents a 7% decrease over 2019. The State of North Carolina requires all 911 centers to answer at least 90% of all 911 calls within 10 seconds. Stanly County Communications answered 99.16% of all 911 calls within 10 seconds.



# Emergency Management

A three (3) tiered department: Emergency Management, Emergency Medical Service (EMS), and the Fire Marshal's Office (FMO).

Emergency Management defines an 'all-hazards' approach to preparedness, response, recovery and mitigation of any natural, man-made or terrorist disaster.

- Maintained a Storm Ready Status
- March 2020 was dedicated to COVID-19 response, including PPE request and resource management, EOC activation and coordination with all local and regional response agencies
- Stanly County's #1 weather threat is flash flooding. "Always Remember Do Not Drive Through Flooded Waters!"
- Emergency Management responded to 6 hazardous material spills
- Completed the update to our Hazard Mitigation Plan in June 2020

**Emergency Medical Services** continues to adapt and grow with the changing pre-hospital medical practices

- Responded to 14,964 calls (decrease of 7%)
- Operate six (6) Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulances
- Continue to provide community paramedic services to support the local opioid issue and COVID-19 vaccine distribution
- A new EMS swift water and search & rescue team have been developed to support local first responder efforts
- The new eastside (Hilco Street) EMS base was completed in October 2020 and is now fully operational

The Fire Marshal's Office continues to strive for excellence in service.

- Conducted 373 fire inspections (increase of 13%)
- Reviewed 124 commercial development plans (increase of 46%)
- Responded to 109 fire investigations (increase of 28%)
- Assisted Aquadale VFD & the West Stanly VFD with insurance rating reductions
- Key partner in the County's COVID-19 response by disbursing PPE supplies to all first response agencies

### **HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES**

Health Department

The Health Department has been on the front lines of the COVID-19 pandemic since March 2020. The Health Dept. has been the lead agency locally for testing, contract tracing, investigations and more.

The Health Department also took steps to enhance and protect clients from COVID exposure at the clinic by constructing a wall to separate well and sick patients in the waiting room area and installing UV lights to the HVAC system.


#### Grants to Reduce the Tax Burden

\$35,000 – The dental clinic was awarded a Duke Endowment grant to expand school based prevention efforts with the dental sealant program for middle school children

\$79,000 – A grant from the NC Dept. of Health and Human Services aimed at reducing infant mortality in minority populations

\$150,000 – Community Health action grant to expand primary care access to uninsured adults (18 and older) in our community

Social Services

The mission of the Stanly County Department of Social Services is to promote self-sufficiency, and to protect and improve the quality of life for Stanly County residents. The agency provides services to protect vulnerable adults and children, promote economic stability, and increase access to health care and nutrition. Approximately 164 individuals visit the agency on a daily basis.

The department is required by law to receive and investigate reports of abuse or neglect of children. If abuse or neglect is found to exist, services must be provided to protect the child from further abuse and neglect and help the parents learn to provide better care for the child. 891 child abuse and/or neglect reports were received; of those, 541 (61%) were substantiated and evaluated to determine the level of services needed.

### Veterans Services

This office assists veterans, dependents and surviving spouses with applications and forms required for Federal, State and County benefits through the Veteran Administration (VA). The Veteran Services Officer is the only fully-accredited representative that is authorized to represent the NC Division of Veterans Affairs and present claims before the US Department of Veteran Affairs in the county. This accreditation enables this office to access electronic files within the Veterans Administration to better assist all veterans and their families. All services are free of charge and we continue to encourage all veterans, dependents and surviving spouses to take advantage of all the services and benefits our Stanly County Veterans have earned.

- Provided assistance to over 1,900 Stanly County veterans, dependents and surviving spouses.
- Assisted with claims resulting in approximately \$620,000 in back payments and monthly payments of \$98,000
- NC license tags, property tax exclusions and hunting/fishing licenses for veterans are authorized via the local Veteran Services Office



### Senior Services

Senior Services Department, a NC Senior Center of Excellence for the 13th consecutive year, provides quality services, programs, activities and opportunities to promote and enhance the well-being of seniors. A satellite Senior Center in the Locust Town Center is operated in partnership with the Stanly County YMCA.

#### **Key Accomplishments:**

- Constructed numerous COVID mitigation barriers throughout the County's multiple facilities
- Replaced the north end roof at the Commons
- Repayed and restriped the 1st Street side of the Commons facility
- Fully renovated the public restroom facilities in the Health & Human Services wing of the Commons facility
- Replaced a large section of concrete at the Courthouse parking lot
- Constructed a wall to segregate sick and well patients in the Health Dept.

The Register of Deeds maintains public records and documents, including records relating to real estate ownership and vital records. We ensure that the documents received in this office reflect the trust that citizens place in us. E-recording has been implemented. Electronic recording allows attorneys and lending institutions to electronically file documents without having to present their documents in person or by mail.

- Total revenues: \$985,184 (increase of 8% from 2019)
- Processed 22,919 documents (increase of 7% from 2019)
- Land transfers totaled 2,686 (increase of 4% from 2019)
- Excise tax receipts totaled \$656,177 (increase of 8% from 2019)

This year the Register of Deeds' annual "Thank You for Your Service" program to celebrate and honor local veterans was a bit different due to COVID-19. A pancake breakfast and raffle to raise funds for the Stanly County Veteran Relief Fund was held. The event raised \$2,900.00 from generous donations. A special thank you to the Stanly County Senior Center in Albemarle and Encounter Christ Church in the western part of Stanly County for their assistance with the event this year.

### Tax Administration

The Stanly County Tax Administration Office is comprised of two sections: the Collector's Office and the Assessor's Office, which includes Real Property and Personal Property.

The Collector's Office collects the levy due Stanly County, ten (10) municipalities, thirteen (13) Fire Districts, and two (2) Special Districts. They also collect for nuisance liens and EMS bills.



The Collector's Office yielded a 97.32% collection rate for FY 19-20. Collection enforcement methods utilized included Garnishments, Bank Attachments, Debt Setoff, Escheat, and Foreclosure. \$94,500+ of delinquent tax revenue was generated through the Foreclosure process.

The Assessor's Office is responsible for valuing all real estate, improvements to real estate, personal property, business personal property, and motor vehicles.



The Real Property Division continued their effort to complete the 2021 revaluation project which involves visiting/appraising all 40,000 parcels in the county. Appraisers are also responsible for listing new construction and hearing valuation appeals. Appraisers completed roughly 1,200 field visits for new construction and appeals.



The Personal Property Division processed 1,000+ Homestead and Veterans exemptions, resulting in an exclusion amount of \$52.4 million in tax value. The NC DMV "Tax and Tag" program processed an average of 5,213 registered motor vehicles monthly with a 99.32% collection rate. The Personal Property Division also sent out approximately 8,525 personal property listings and 2,958 business personal property listings in 2020.

programs are proactive in addressing issues identified by the Extension Advisory Board and seven (7) advisory program committees led by Extension





Agents within the areas of agriculture, foods and 4-H Youth Development. Online and virtual programming was the focus in 2020 given the pandemic.



Agriculture: There were some socially distanced on-farm demonstrations this past year related to cotton variety trials and soybean plot testing. Multiple virtual workshops were offered for agricultural operations including small ruminant, everything beef and hands on caterpillar

tunnel construction workshops. A Master Gardener virtual workshop series was also held in 2020.

Safe and secure food and farms systems: A socially distanced in-person pesticide license test was held as well as an on-line certification class.



Foods: Given many folks did not have fitness facility or gym access for most of 2020, the Cooperative Extension staff brought fitness to the home via the "Lift & Lift Plus" virtual classes. Further, several online programs related to cooking were provided. Over 100 plus healthy recipes were featured in the SNAP, on social media and the local radio station. Further, Cooperative Extension secured a \$1,000 grant to provide a box that included recipes and ingredients for holiday meals for 50 local families.

4-H Youth Development: 4-H did its best to reach youth and adults virtually as well. On average each online experiment that was featured via the "Got Science Daily" program was viewed by 652 Facebook users and each lesson has at least 25 active participants. Additionally several youth leadership programs transitioned to digital and online platforms allowing our youth to actively participate in county, district and statewide competitions.

The Planning Department works with landowners and developers to permit the best uses of property throughout the county. Consistent with the 2010 Land Use Plan or areas with infrastructure in place to support new development.

Staff coordinated nine (9) rezoning or text change requests through the Planning Board, two (2) special use permits, one (1) request for a variance with the Board of Adjustment and one (1) request for Administrative Relief from setback and similar zoning requirements.

- Issued Zoning Compliance Permits for the municipalities of Albemarle, Misenheimer, Red Cross, New London, Badin and Norwood.
- Enforced the Zoning Ordinance and Minimum Housing Code for the municipalities of New London, Badin, Norwood Locust and Stanfield
- Enforced the Public Nuisance Ordinances for New London and Norwood.
- Issued floodplain development permits throughout the county with the exception of Albemarle


Staff worked directly with three (3) companies to announce the creation of Water, Air, Land, Innovation,

415 new jobs and \$347.9 million in new taxable investment this year.


The EDC also met directly with forty two (42) local businesses to ensure they have the resources they need to be successful and profitable in Stanly County.

### **Utilities**

Stanly County Utilities (SCU) is responsible for distributing more than 1.68 million gallons of drinking water every day to more than 6,500 homes, schools, churches and businesses in Stanly County


SCU provides wastewater collection and treatment to over 970 customers in the Greater Badin District. Wastewater collection is provided to the northern part of Stanly County, the County Airport region plus the communities of Palestine, Millingport, Ridgecrest and Aquadale. SCU provides wastewater treatment at our West Stanly Facility for the towns of Locust, Stanfield, Red Cross and Oakboro.


This past year the following projects were completed:

- Completion of the Palestine Water Booster Pump Station to improve the reliability of water delivery to the citizens in the Town of Badin as well as residents near the Stanly County Airport
- Webb Road water main extension

On-going projects for 2021 and beyond include:

- The West Stanly Waste Water Treatment Plant renovation to increase capacity to 1.2 million gallons per day. The project is under construction and scheduled to be complete in December 2021
- Design and construct a new Liberty Hill water pump station to assure higher water volume delivery to western Stanly County
- The \$13.9 million Water & Sewer Authority Phase 4 project to improve access to public water has been approved for funding by the USDA. The project is under final design and will be bid in 2021.
- Bost Road water main extension project
- A \$1.2 million renovation/upgrade of the Town of Richfield's sewer collection system. The County is seeking a 100% grant from NC DEQ for the project.
